When I was in my twenties and thirties – a very, very long time ago – I would occasionally participate in 5 kilometer races.

I did this for two basic reasons. I did it because I still exercise in some way just about every day and training for a race, at least for me, made daily exercise leading up to the race more interesting. The other reason was that in most races you received a cool teeshirt for running.

I can assure you that I did not participate in these races to compete and win. I am absolutely not a long-distance runner. I just wanted to enjoy a good workout with other people and finish the race.

I hold a vivid memory from the first 5K in which I ran. I can even tell you it was in West Chicago, IL, a town, well, about 35 miles west of the city of Chicago.

I was a 5K rookie runner so everything about the race was new to me. I checked in at registration, received my new cool t-shirt, and bang, we were off. I found a jogging pace that was good for me and settled into the race.

That's when it happened. We were into the race at about the first kilometer mark. The runners around me and I turned left onto a new street and I noticed a gathering of about 20 people or so up ahead on the right side of the street. As we approached I began to deduce what was happening.

This was a group of volunteers who had set up multiple tables just off the side of the road. The tabletops were filled with paper cups holding water. As runners approached the tables the volunteers would reach out and offer a cup of water to the runners. And that's not all they would do. They shouted encouraging words to us. While handing us cups full of water they yelled – "You can do this! You're doing great! We're with you! We're proud of you!"

It was just this little race, in this little town, a tiny speck in the grand cosmos decades ago and I will never forget it. Encouragement can be a powerful thing. Sometimes encouragement is the only thing.

As the years have passed I have decided that moment in my first 5K race is an apt symbol for the church as the body of Christ. Sometimes the holiest thing we can do as a faith community is offer to each other, and the world, Christ's words of encouragement.

Whatever you are facing today – you can do this – we're with you. The Christ is with you.






Book Review

Cyber Safety

Ohio Turnpike Scam

The Ohio Turnpike and Infrastructure Commission has reported a text message scam that fraudulently claims to represent tolling agencies across the country. Scammers request payment for unpaid tolls through fake websites. These messages are sent to random phone numbers, not tied to any specific account or toll road usage. Some recipients also reported receiving phishing emails. The Ohio Turnpike does not request E-ZPass payments via text, nor does it handle unpaid tolls through text messages. The only legitimate websites for Ohio Turnpike's E-ZPass accounts are ezpassoh.com and ohioturnpike.org. For questions about the Ohio Turnpike's E-ZPass notifications, contact

www.ezpassoh.com or www.ohioturnpike.org.

The FBI, aware of these impostor scams in several states, recommends the following actions if you

receive a fraudulent message:

Report the incident to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) at www.ic3.gov, and be sure to include:

- The phone number from where the text originated.
- Contact the tolling agency's customer service center.
- Delete any texts received.

If you clicked any link or provided your information, make efforts to secure your personal information and financial accounts and dispute any unfamiliar charges.
